**Corpus Christi Sunday
John 6:51-58**

The story is told about a non-practicing Catholic whose house was located across from the church. Every morning his wife would wake him up to accompany her to church to attend Holy Mass, but he would always refuse. Out of curiosity, one day he decided to go with his wife just to see what was going on during Holy Mass.

Upon going inside the church the Holy Mass had just begun and to his amazement he saw angels all over the altar, especially near the tabernacle. During consecration, instead of the Holy Host, he saw real flesh being raised up by the Priest for the faithful to adore. Thereafter the man became a faithful believer and a regular presence in the daily celebration of Holy Mass.

When Jesus said: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will love forever, and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51). The Jews did not believe Him. In fact they said, "How can this man give us His flesh to eat? (John 6:52) Indeed how can the Sacred Host that we receive during Holy Communion become the body of Jesus? It takes faith to believe the real presence of Jesus' body and blood during Holy Communion. Obviously, the Jews who were complaining about this brave declaration of Jesus, did not have faith.

How about us? Do we believe in this Bread of Life discourse of Jesus? Do we believe that it is Jesus' Body and Divinity that we are going to partake during Holy Communion? After receiving Jesus, do we kneel and deeply communicate with Him? Or do we just kneel because that's the gesture that we have to do and we do it just for the sake of doing it?

Many go to Holy Mass every Sunday, or some, everyday, but not everyone goes through the process of conversion. It is the simple truth that we don't always allow ourselves to be converted by the Body and Blood of Jesus.

We persist to dominate Jesus when refuse His call to walk away from our sinfulness. We continue to resist Jesus and continue to do things our way instead of letting Jesus show us the way. There can be a miracle in your life when you begin to believe.

Elements of the Mass

Episode 30: The Liturgical Movement. In essence, the liturgical movement is the effort on the part of the Church to help the faithful participate better at Mass. This meant, initially, that the people would participate in the singing and in giving the responses. Over the course of time, the Church realized that it is important that the people be able to enter deeply into the mystery by understanding what's going on during Mass. This means especially that they consciously participate in the offering. The liturgical movement helped to foster this kind of participation. In the 1920s, a Benedictine monk, Virgil Michel, returned to America from his studies in Europe with some magnificent insights about the richness of the liturgy and the ability of the faithful to participate. One of the fundamental ideas he shared with the American Church was that prayer in the church must be connected with action in the world. With Dorothy Day, the founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, Virgil Michel showed Catholics how prayer and concern for the poor should be woven together. Pope Pius XII echoes this notion in Mediator Dei when he insists, "it is fitting that the mind believes what the lips sing, and that what the mind believes should be practice in public and private life." The liturgical movement is indeed a movement—but it is not fundamentally about changing the liturgy, rather the liturgy is intended to change us: to make us more aware, more receptive to the treasures of the Church's public prayer. "The Liturgical Movement, therefore, as the words indicate, is a movement—a movement towards the liturgy." It is the effort to bring the people themselves closer to the liturgy, to understand it more fully, to enter into it more deeply, and to participate and benefit from it more completely. The Liturgical Movement is the effort to help the people participate better in the Mass: fully, consciously, and actively.
